- Chairman and up to five other members
- Duration of Appointment is one to three years

- Chief Executive
- Three separate Directors, each for Energy, Water and
 - Mineral Resources.
- Support Staff

- Liberalisation of segments of market
- Adoption of transparent regulatory framework



The Policy Process

MRA achieves its aims through consultation
